Dayton Children's Health Partners is one of the region's only pediatric-specific collaborative focusing on quality and value across the care continuum.

Our mission is to improve the well-being of children in our region through an integrated, collaborative pediatric network aimed at providing cost effective, high quality care. Our vision is to be the network of choice for patients, payers and providers.

To achieve our mission and vision, practices identify opportunities to collectively leverage care-coordination dollars to manage high and rising risk patients.

Dayton Children's Health Partners is developing and implementing evidencebased quality programs to improve outcomes, increase efficiency and reduce costs in pediatric care.

the value of membership:

- Develop co-management programs between membership and pediatric specialists to standardize care for specific conditions across the continuum of care
- Implement quality improvement initiatives across payers, such as reducing potentially avoidable ED visits
- Utilize grant money to embed behavioral health consultants in member practices.
- Aggregate and leverage big data for analysis, risk stratification and reporting
- Work collaboratively to tackle mental health needs in pediatric primary care
- Partner with payers to understand and implement value-based reimbursement
- Participate in regional population health initiatives such as the Asthma Alliance and Mental Health Advisory Alliance
- Support provider license renewal such as Maintenance of Certification (MOC), Part 4



Did you know?

- Since 2018, the network has earned just over \$2.37 million in per member per month (PMPM) payments and in 2020 earned \$478,000 in shared savings
- Practices in the network range in size from a solo provider to 26 providers and are located as far north as Sidney and as far south as Middletown
- 3 100 network members are engaged in network committees and workgroups, including primary care providers, office leaders, behavioral health consultants and specialists
- The network employs 2 care coordinators to assist in reducing total cost of care
- The network utilizes Innovaccer, a data aggregation tool, that enables reporting from seven different electronic health records

- The network has received over \$320,000 from the Maxon Foundation to support the integration of behavioral health into primary care practices
- The network employs 2 mental health professionals to support the implementation of integrated behavioral health in primary care using Maxon Foundation and Anthem dollars
- 8 Four network practices have hired behavioral health consultants using Maxon Foundation dollars
- The network offers opportunities to collaborate with Dayton Children's specialists through a quality improvement lens
- The network provides continuing medical education (CME) credit and maintenance of certification (MOC) credit for all quality improvement and co-management projects
- Practices receive monthly practice and provider level progress reports for quality improvement projects
